This form is timed! You will have 10 minutes to complete the form once you make your Registration Selection.

The form may only be submitted ONCE.

Each participant is required to register under their own Costumer's Guild West account profile. Do NOT use a friend's or family member's account to register yourself – doing so will prevent them from being able to register and may prevent you from being able to participate in the **Workshop Registration Priority Lottery**.

THURSDAY'S TOUR IS OVER THE TOP!

Join us for an incredible behind-the-scenes day in Hollywood with not one, but TWO visits to professional costume houses where costumes are created for film, television, theater, and stage.

We'll visit Bill Hargate Costumes, Inc., hosted by Costume College favorite Rory Cunningham, and Muto-Little Custom Made Costumes, owned by Antoinette Muto and Kimberly Little. Important: These are working studios. No photos are allowed, and all visitors must respect confidentiality agreements.

Notes for visitors: Studios are active workspaces — please wear close-fitting clothing. Muto-Little has two floors and no elevator. There are many restaurants nearby, and we'll pause for lunch at your own expense.

After lunch, we'll visit the Los Angeles County Museum of Art for a self-guided experience of the exhibition Fashioning Chinese Women: Empire to Modernity, with time to explore the museum, shop, and outdoor installations.

This tour includes bus, presentations, admission to the exhibits, water and snacks. Our journey runs from 8:15 a.m. to approximately 5p.m. Cost is \$95 per person.

LA Fabric District Tour Monday, August 3, 2026

Once again, Costume College will be offering a tour of the Fabric District in Downtown Los Angeles. Whether you are looking for natural fiber fabrics to create historical garments or fabrics to realize your fantasy dreams, you will find what you need there. There is hardly any fabric, trim or tool you can imagine that you can't find with a little guidance (from me) and a native guidebook.

An air conditioned bus will transport you from and back to the hotel on Monday, August 4. The bus leaves the hotel promptly at 9AM and will leave town to go back to the hotel promptly at 3PM. Traffic being what it is in Los Angeles, punctuality is important. Travel here is not so much a function of distance as it is time of day.

As we will be traveling in over the road buses, there will be plenty of room for all of your purchases (or your luggage if you are planning to head straight to the airport on your own from downtown.) The buses park all day in a centrally located place so that you can store your purchases while you continue shopping or if you would just like a comfortable place to sit down and take a break. Light snacks and water are provided on the bus.

Prior to the tour, you will receive your e-copy of the Native Guide Book listing the names, addresses and variety of items sold in most of the larger stores. (Hard copies of the book will not be available.) The book will also contain the names and addresses for some of the local eateries.

Classes! A Student's Guide

The schedule is as accurate as we can make it. We will update the Registration Book and Pull-out Schedules if changes are made, so be sure to check the schedule closer to Costume College. Last minute changes will be posted at the Information Desk and in the Costume College App.

All workshops and lectures end 15 minutes prior to scheduled end time to allow for class change over. E.g., a scheduled one-hour class is actually 45 minutes.

LECTURE CLASSES: The teacher “talks” to the students and may illustrate with PowerPoint presentation, slides, props, charts, or actual items.

- Any registered student of Costume College may attend as many lecture classes as they can fit into the weekend!
- No sign up necessary.
- Be on time! Lecture classes fill fast!
- Classroom capacity is determined by room size and safety restrictions.
- We recommend you bring some cash (in small bills, \$1 or \$5) for optional handouts (these can sell out quickly!)

WORKSHOP CLASSES: The students experience “hands-on” learning by performing the techniques being instructed. These have a class size limit, and a fee for materials. Students may need to bring additional listed supplies with them. Make sure to note the skill level of the Workshop and only sign up for Workshops that match your skill level. Make note of any materials you will need to provide for yourself, listed in the “Students Provide” section for each Workshop. The Teacher will only provide the items listed in the “Kit Content” section. Please note that all kit fees listed for Workshop classes include a \$5 processing fee.

Workshop classes have a set number of students, allowing teachers to create a more intimate environment for their class. Students sign up and pay for Workshop classes in advance online. All Registered students will be emailed the link to a form on the CGW website inviting them to sign up for Workshops. Only registered Costume College students will be able to sign up for Workshop classes.

Available seats after Online Registration is complete *may* be available at the On-Site Workshop Registration Desk during Costume College in the Prefunction Foyer on the ground floor (see back map), Thursday, July 30, 7:00pm-8:30pm. To ensure an equal chance for all students, you must pick-up your Check-in materials first and then may only sign up for one (1) Workshop each time you go through the line. You may only purchase On-site Workshops for yourself (or an accompanying minor). To secure your seat, you will need to pay for your class on the spot either by cash or check.

Remember, while the Workshop classes are always fun and exciting, there are a huge number of other things to see and do!

Things to Remember About Workshop Classes:

- Workshop classes are not transferable. You may not give away or sell your seat to anyone else.
- Please do not approach teachers to ask if you can attend a class you are not enrolled in or if you can “sit quietly in the back and watch.”
- Workshop Fees are refundable less a \$5 processing fee until June 29, 2026.
- Please pay attention to the notes about “Student Provides” list for each Workshop. Be sure to bring the required supplies — you will learn the most from your classes if you are prepared.

Classes! A Student's Guide, cont.

Class Skill Level:

In order for all students to get the most out of the workshops, please register for workshops within your skill level only. The following skill level descriptions will help to determine which classes are best suited for you. Remember, an advanced student can learn new tips and techniques from classes of all skill levels, but beginners may struggle in advanced classes and take away from the experience for others.

<u>Skill Level</u>	<u>Description</u>
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All:	Enjoyable and accessible to all attendees.
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Beginner:	Designed for those with little or no previous sewing or other applicable experience.
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Intermediate:	Requires basic knowledge in the topic, such as ability to construct a garment from a commercial pattern.
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Advanced:	Requires specialized knowledge. Please see the class description for specific requirements.
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Tips to get the most out of your classes:

- Taking notes helps reinforce your learning experience, and provide a handy reference long after the class is over.
- You may take photographs with the permission of the teacher.
- Audio or video taping of any kind is strictly prohibited, unless specifically allowed by the instructor.
- As a student, please keep comments, personal stories, and/or experiences to a minimum, unless requested by the teacher. Ask your questions during the time designated by the instructor.
- Our teachers are graciously volunteering their time to be a part of the conference. Please let them know you appreciate their hard work!
- Find yourself wanting to attend two classes scheduled at the same time? Use the buddy system! Go to one class and trade notes with someone who went to the other one.

Workshop & Tour Registration Information

Costume College Workshop and Tour Registration Procedure for 2026!

To not overwhelm our registration, you will choose from one of five groups (named after embellishments) which will correspond to your assigned day to register for Workshops and Tours. The five choices will be randomly sorted, lottery-style. Anybody registering after that date will be assigned to the 6th group. On your assigned day, the registration forms will open for your assigned group. (You must sign into your CGW account under the profile you used to register for Costume College).

Rules – Workshops

- You may select up to three (3) workshops
- All selected workshops must be for yourself
 - All workshops must be for your OWN registered student profile
 - You may not register family or household members
 - Workshop spots are NON-TRANSFERABLE
- You may not register for multiple workshops in the same time slot
 - ALL overlapping workshop selections will be automatically canceled and refunded.

Workshop registration is separate from the Tour registration – there are TWO forms, and each may only be submitted ONCE! At a later date, the workshop and tour forms will re-open for all registered students to sign up for any remaining workshop spots.

Rules – Tours

- You may select up to two (2) tours
- All selected tours must be for yourself
 - All tours must be for your OWN registered student profile
 - You may not register family or household members
 - Tour spots are NON-TRANSFERABLE

Refunds policy: Workshop Fees are refundable less a \$5 processing fee until June 15, 2026. Tour Fees are refundable less a \$5 processing fee until June 30, 2026.

Transfers: Workshops & Tours are NOT transferable.

And now, the question we know everyone will be asking: **HOW DOES THE LOTTERY WORK?**

All students registering by April 4, 2026 will select from one of five embellishments on the registration form. This choice will determine your group. (The groups have limited numbers to ensure an even distribution.) IMPORTANT: THE GROUPS DO NOT YET HAVE AN ORDER. On April 7, 2026, the groups will be placed in a random order. On April 7, 2026, you will receive an email letting you know which day your group has been assigned (i.e. which day you will be able to access the workshop registration form) along with links to the forms. Workshop and Tour registration will begin for the first group on April 9, 2026 and will open each successive day for the rest of the groups, with the final group gaining access to registration on April 13, 2026.

Frequently asked questions:

How do I know which embellishments to pick when registering for Costume College to get the earliest workshop registration date?

You don't. NO ONE knows which group will be first to register until after April 7th.

What happens if I register for Costume College after April 7th?

You will be able to register for workshops starting on Tuesday, April 14th.

I'm a Teacher (or on the Costume College Committee)! How does this affect my registration?

The lottery DOES NOT affect workshop registration for Teachers and Committee Members. Teacher and Committee Member Registration will be on April 6th and is not affected by the lottery. You will still be asked to select an embellishment when registering for Costume College, however this will not change your registration date.

What happens if I'm unavailable on my assigned registration day?

Your assigned day is the EARLIEST date you may register for workshops. The form will remain available to you until June 15th or when all workshops have filled.

What happens if I have a minor child attending a workshop?

If this situation applies to you, you must both choose the same embellishment (group). Please contact the Student Liaison (cocostudents@gmail.com) BEFORE workshop registration opens (no later than April 8th) for all accommodations.

What if I need ADA accommodations to help me with workshop registration and/or attending workshops?

Please contact the Student Liaison (cocostudents@gmail.com) BEFORE workshop registration opens and they will be able to assist you.

What if I have another question not answered here?

Adjusting Patterns to Fit Full & Small Busts

Skill Level: Intermediate

Kit Fee: \$7

Required Skills: Use of commercial sewing patterns, garment construction

Kit Contents: Tracing paper, tape, half scale bodice pattern

Student Provides: Pencil, eraser, scissors, straight edge/ruler, cloth tape measure. Optional: drafting curves, bodice pattern to modify

Commercial patterns are typically drafted for an average of a B cup and frequently don't fit when made up. Get hands-on practice adjusting a sewing pattern to fit a full or small bust, modifying darts, and resolving common bust-related fit issues. This class will also discuss how to interpret mockups to further refine the fit around the bust.

Basic Smocking and Creative Uses

Smocking has been utilized since the Middle Ages to create function and beauty in everyday garments. In costuming for film and stage, smocking has evolved to create gorgeous patterns and details that catch the eye and support the stories being told. In this class, we'll cover three different forms of smocking, creative uses and embellishments.

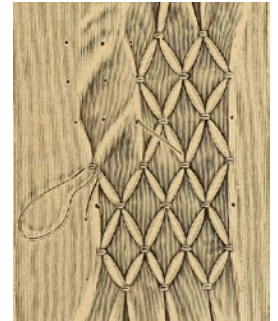

Required Skills: Basic hand sewing

Kit Fee: \$10

Kit Contents: Hand needles, beading needles, thread, muslin, assorted beads, hand-out

Student Provides: Snips, ruler, marking pen or pencil

Bead Embroidery for Historic Costuming and Cosplay

Beads, sequins, and stones can all be used to elevate your costume design, add texture, and help to replicate an existing museum piece. This workshop will explain the differences between types, tools to use, and how to keep lines of beading straight, along with mastering curves. You will be making a beading sampler for future reference.

Skill Level: All Skill Levels

Required Skills: Confident with hand sewing

Kit Fee: \$30

Kit Contents: hand-out, beading needles, beading thread, needle threader, embroidery hoop, base fabric, beads/stones/sequins, fabric marking pen

Student Provides: Small scissors. OPTIONAL: metal thimble for pressing prongs

Learn the basics of needle lace, sometimes called needle-point lace or Venice Lace. Needle lace is fun to make and requires no special equipment or supplies. It can be any shape (like a mask) or size. We will make a butterfly applique during this workshop, but the applications are endless.

Skill Level: Beginner

Required Skills: General basic embroidery skills

Kit Fee: \$5

Kit Contents: Paper pattern and hand-out, backing fabric

Student Provides: 2 sizes of crochet thread (a fat 1 (#10 or fatter) and a thin 1 #60 or thinner), sewing needle (sharp, with an eye big enough for your fat crochet thread), ordinary sewing thread, scissors

DIY Perfect Pleater Board

About Costume College

Costume College is an annual three-day costuming arts conference created and produced by Costumer's Guild West, Inc.

Costume College is a welcoming and non-competitive environment where attendees share and disseminate information/skills.

We offer lectures and workshops on all things costuming: from general sewing (pattern grading, setting sleeves, etc.) to historical construction methods (corsetry, petticoats, etc.) to time period overview classes to science fiction/fantasy costume construction.

All of our classes are taught by volunteers who enjoy sharing their knowledge on a particular topic. Teacher volunteers come from our membership, local costumers and costume designers, industry personnel, costume related business owners, craftspeople specializing in costume related crafts, cosplayers, costume researchers, dress historians and sewing specialists. Invited guest teachers are usually experts in their field and are usually selected based upon their expertise tying in with the theme or bonus track for that particular year.

Along with the opportunity to learn new skills, we offer our attendees several social gatherings to show off their creations! We host a Welcome Party, a Friday Social, a Gala Dinner & Dance, and an Afternoon Tea (the Gala and the Tea each have a separate admission).

We also have a Marketplace filled with fabulous vendors who cater to costumers and an Exhibit Room filled with costumes created by our attendees. Both the Marketplace and Exhibit Room are open to the public and do not require a separate admission.

Costume College is the perfect opportunity to meet people who share a love of costuming!

About Costumers Guild West

Costumer's Guild West, Inc. (CGW) is a 501(c)3, non-profit, volunteer-operated, educational organization dedicated to the art of costuming. We welcome all levels and styles of costumers, whether professional or hobbyist; novice, or master. We are here to encourage, nurture, and educate those who are creating and researching costuming arts including but not exclusive to historical dress, cosplay, and entertainment costuming, encompassed in a safe and supportive environment.

Located in sunny Southern California, our vision is to fill an educational void and encourage hands-on learning in all aspects of the art of costuming. We host lectures and workshops throughout the year; along with tours of costume exhibits and various costumed social events. In addition, we help encourage learning about the costuming arts by working with local museums to sponsor fashion shows and exhibits.

We are the host organization for Costume College®, an annual three-day costuming arts conference. Costume College is a welcoming and non-competitive environment where attendees share and disseminate information/skills. We maintain a Costume College Scholarship program to assist beginning costumers or those in financial need or those who have served CGW. Costume College scholarships may also be awarded during masquerades at local conventions and the costume contest at the Los Angeles County Fair.

CGW is governed by our Board of Directors. The 9-member Board of Directors is comprised of volunteers from our membership who are elected annually at our Annual Membership Meeting. Our Board of Directors meets bi-monthly to oversee the planning of events and the general operations of the organization.

All of our events are planned and organized by volunteers, the smaller of which generally require only couple of volunteers to put together. However, our annual conference, Costume College is planned and organized by a dedicated committee of 30+ volunteers, headed by the Dean and Assistant Dean. If you are interested in volunteering, we will be happy to hear from you.

Costume College Policies

Conferences bring a large group of diverse people together. Even though we all have a love of costumes in common, we come from varying backgrounds. Remember that someone that you see only once or twice a year or have only just met, may have a different comfort level – verbally, visually, and physically – than you do. Please note, these policies are subject to change at any time without notice.

Safety Issues for Conventions

We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable time at Costume College. The world has become unpredictable as people are acting out in violent manners due to domestic and terror related issues. Large venues can be targets of these events. Your leadership wanted to share ideas with you in case an event like this happens at Costume College or any gathering you may be attending.

If you are in a situation:

RUN: Know where the exits are at the event and have several different escape routes in mind in case your 1st choice is blocked. Once you have reached a safe place away from the incident, call “911” and give Law Enforcement any information that could help First Responders (location, number of suspect(s), suspect(s) description, weapons, any injuries).

HIDE & BARRICADE: If you are unable to exit safely, find a room that can be locked from the inside. Put furniture/items blocking the door. Turn off the lights. Turn off cell phones. Be quiet. Wait till Law Enforcement arrives to escort you to safety.

FIGHT: If confronted with a person trying to harm you, you need to fight for your life. Use anything available to defend/protect yourself (chairs, books, lamps). Control the hand with the weapon. Work as a team to control the suspect. We have not received any threats against our group and do not anticipate you needing to use these tactics but they are good safety precautions to keep in mind.

Minor Policy

All Costume College attendees under the age of 18 must provide emergency contact information when registering. If under the age of 16, the attendee must be accompanied to all classes and events by a parent or guardian who is a registered Costume College attendee.

Minors ages 16 or 17 do not need a parent or legal guardian to attend classes and events with them, but a parent or legal guardian must be at the hotel at all times while the minor is in the hotel.

Any attendee under 18 who wishes to attend a Tour must be accompanied by an adult. (Tour tickets are required for both the minor and the accompanying adult and must be purchased through the general Tour registration process.)

Weapons Policy

Costumes sometimes come in the form of characters with weapons, and in many cases, these weapons look quite real. Convention operations prefers that these items be peace bonded. A peace bond is a very visible lock or tie on a realistic looking weapon to make clear to security and to police that it is not intended to be used for violent purposes. The peace bond will usually come in the form of a zip tie over the trigger such that it couldn't be pulled or holding a bladed weapon in the sheath. If you have a costume with a realistic-looking weapon, please stop into Ops to have them check it.

- All weapons must conform to state and federal law.
- All weapons must be non-functional.
- Weapons may not be pointed at another person except in a non-threatening manner for the purposes of exhibition or photographs.
- Weapons or Costumes that are deemed by Ops to be a safety hazard for any reason will be banned.
- Use of a weapon in an inappropriate, negligent, or threatening manner is forbidden and may result in suspension of membership.

Dress Code

Costume College and all CGW events are PG-13 events. Be mindful that we are in public spaces and there will be people present who are not a part of our event.

We love costumes at Costume College, however, costumes are never required. We don't want to discourage anyone from wearing a costume at the event, but you should be aware of the environment and spaces you are wearing it in, both for your own comfort and to make sure our events remain navigable for all attendees.

Costumes are not needed in classrooms and can be a distraction when attending classes. If you choose to wear a costume during the day, make sure it takes up minimal space (horizontally and vertically) to ensure that everyone is able to fully participate in their class.

Costume College Policies, continued

Additionally, we ask that you are thoughtful and respectful of others when choosing a costume. Ensembles that demean or mock a culture, lifestyle, or groups of people are not appropriate for our events. Outfits that contain or reference hate speech, crude or offensive language, or sexually explicit content will not be tolerated. Please carefully consider the effect your costume may have on other attendees.

CGW reserves the right to deem a costume unacceptable and request that the wearer make modifications as necessary. If those modifications are unsuccessful or the wearer chooses not to comply with this request, the attendee will be asked to leave the event and no refunds will be issued.

Health & Safety Policies

Code of Conduct and Anti-Harassment Policy

In order to participate in a Costumer's Guild West, Inc. (CGW) event or interact in CGW/Costume College social media spaces, all attendees, presenters, vendors, sponsors, and volunteers agree to abide by this Code of Conduct. CGW reserves the exclusive and sole right to enforce its code of conduct, define what constitutes unacceptable behavior, and determine what actions it will take to address incidents that occur.

In order to support an environment that builds community and positive connections, the following behaviors are expected of all participants:

- Act with respect and kindness towards everyone you encounter (in-person and online), including other attendees, presenters, vendors, event staff, and venue staff.
- Be mindful of your surroundings and of your fellow participants.
- Ask permission before touching another person or any of their belongings. If permission is not granted, please accept that and walk away.
- Behave in accordance with all venue and event policies and applicable laws.
- If you are asked by CGW or venue staff to stop a behavior that is deemed unacceptable, you are expected to comply immediately.

To comply with this code, participants agree to avoid unacceptable behavior. Examples of such include, but are not limited, to the following:

- Violations of our Anti-Harassment Policy or Dress Code.
- Microaggressions of any kind. (A microaggression is a verbal, behavioral or environmental slight, indignity, or snub – intentional or unintentional – that demeans, invalidates the experience of, expresses a prejudiced or discriminatory attitude, or communicates hostility or a negative message towards a marginalized group.)
- Behaviors that generally interfere with other attendees' experience or participation at the event.
- Sustained disruption of presentations or event activities.
- Non-compliance with event or event venue rules or policies.
- Engaging in any activity prohibited by law.

Consequences of Unacceptable Behavior

Unacceptable behavior will not be tolerated at CGW events. If a participant engages in such or fails to comply with expected behavior at any time during the event, CGW may take any action it deems appropriate, including but not limited to removing the participant from the event without a refund and/or prohibiting future attendance at events. Each instance of unacceptable behavior will be investigated and addressed on a case-by-case basis.

Reporting Unacceptable Behavior

If you witness or are subjected to unacceptable behavior or have any other concerns at a CGW event, notify a CGW board member or event volunteer as soon as possible. This may be done in person or via the reporting form linked on our Anti-Harassment Policy page. In the event these are unavailable for any reason, you may also contact us or email the President at president@costumersguild.org.

What is harassment?

Harassment is any behavior that causes discomfort or alarms or threatens another person or group. Harassment can take the form of verbal statements, written statements, physical gestures or acts, and other forms of communication. Such statements or acts need not be directed at a particular person or group but may be implied or insinuated. The person experiencing discomfort or alarm can be someone other than those at whom the harassment is directed, such as a bystander or witness, or

someone who otherwise discovers an incident of harassment. Here are some examples of harassment:

- Offensive comments about:
 - ✓ Race
 - ✓ Color
 - ✓ Religion (includes religious dress and grooming practices)
 - ✓ Sexuality or gender, regardless of whether the harasser and the person being harassed are of the same or different gender
 - ✓ Gender identity, gender expression
 - ✓ Sexual orientation
 - ✓ Marital status
 - ✓ Medical Condition
 - ✓ Pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, and/or related medical conditions
 - ✓ Military or veteran status
 - ✓ National origin
 - ✓ Ancestry
 - ✓ Disability (mental and physical, including HIV/AIDS, cancer, and genetic characteristics)
 - ✓ Genetic information
 - ✓ Physical appearance or body size
- This also includes:
 - ✓ Leering, staring, or suggestive gestures
 - ✓ Stalking or following someone around a public area without their consent
 - ✓ Repeated requests for dates or requests for sexual favors
 - ✓ Showing sexual images or carrying out sexual activities in public spaces
 - ✓ Epithets, slurs, negative stereotyping, offensive jokes, or offensive visual materials related to a protected characteristic
 - ✓ Any written, visual, or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion to an individual or group because of a protected characteristic
 - ✓ Photographing or recording someone when you have been asked not to
 - ✓ Uninvited physical contact, including touching, grabbing, patting, pinching, hugging, kissing
 - ✓ Threatening to physically attack someone
 - ✓ Sexual assault
 - ✓ Graphic verbal commentaries about an individual's body, sexually degrading words used to describe an individual, or obscene letters, notes, or invitations
 - ✓ Harassing communications via letters, phone calls, e-mails, text messaging, or social media
 - ✓ Sustained disruption of classes, talks, or other event
 - ✓ Not wearing your mask properly in places where you are required to do so; refusing to wear a mask while in spaces where you are required to do so

What do I do if I am being harassed?

In some cases you may find the harassment stops if you clearly say “no” or “please leave me alone,” or simply walk away. We would appreciate it if a Costume College Committee or CGW Board member was informed right away to help us identify any repeat offenders. **If you continue to be harassed, don't hesitate to ask for the Dean or the President.** We will mediate the situation, help you contact venue security or law enforcement, or otherwise assist you to feel safe during the conference. Costume College will not retaliate against an individual for coming forward with a complaint of harassment.

What should I do if I see someone else being harassed?

Ask the person being harassed if they are okay. Offer to help them find an appropriate board or committee member to report the problem to, or stay with them while someone else finds help. During the registration process on site, look for the photos of board and committee members, so you will know who can help in case such a need arises.

What can I do if someone accuses me of harassment?

Participants asked to stop harassing behavior must comply immediately. If someone makes a complaint against you, listen, and be aware that your actions may not have come off as you intended them. If this has occurred, be prepared to apologize, sincerely and without qualifiers. Please understand that, in such a situation, the safety of guests is the highest priority.

Costume College Policies, continued

Photography

Costume College engages one or more professional photographers who act in an official capacity for the convention. Official Roving Photographers take candid pictures at events, classes, and in public spaces. Official Studio Photographer(s) take posed portraits of attendees in a designated area. These images are the property of Costumer's Guild West, Inc. and may be used at CGW's discretion. Both studio and candid photos are available after the convention, and digital copies are included as part of your registration fee.

As at any public event, photographs and videos of participants and their guests are taken and posted online. Costume College is a lively event and there is a real possibility that your photograph or a video of you may be taken by Costume College photographers or attendees and thereafter posted on the internet. By attending Costume College, you give your consent to the posting of such photographs and videos by us or others and waive all rights and claims with respect to the posting of such photographs and videos.

While we have no control over other people's websites and social media accounts, Costumer's Guild West, Inc. does not list names with photos or video on our website or social media accounts without express consent from the person in the photo or video. If you would like a posted photo or video on the Costume College or CGW website removed, please contact the Web Team at costumecollegeweb@gmail.com, and it will be taken down.

It is harassment to continue to photograph someone who specifically asks you not to take photographs or videos of them or their belongings. If someone asks you not to take such a photo or video, please comply with their request. Please see our anti-harassment policy for further information.

Registered Costume College attendees may take photos and videos in classrooms for personal use ONLY. No photos or videos may be taken of the teacher, their process, presentation, or work, without the express permission of the teacher. If the teacher permits photos and/or videos, these may only be posted on the internet with the express permission of the teacher.

Outside photographers (that is, photographers not officially engaged by Costume College, who may or may not be registered attendees) are allowed at the event. Outside photography is limited to the public areas of the convention with the exception of the marketplace. Outside photography may not disrupt events or impede the flow of foot traffic. Outside photographers may not monopolize areas intended to be used as photo ops by all attendees.

Outside photographers are not required to purchase registration to Costume College, although they are welcome to do so. All persons present at the event must follow our general event policies.

Outside photographers may not use any equipment other than their camera (e.g., no tripods, stand lights, free-standing light rings, etc.) while taking photographs at Costume College.

Outside photographers may not charge money at Costume College or in the hotel for their pictures, though they may hand out business cards to attendees. No financial transactions for goods or services may take place between outside photographers (whether registered or not) and attendees on-site.

Outside photographers may be asked to cease taking photos or to leave at any time.

These policies are subject to change at any time without notice.

Disability Accommodation

It is the policy of the Costumer's Guild West to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA"). We will not discriminate against any attendee of Costume College. We will also reasonably accommodate all attendees with disabilities unless the accommodations would cause an undue hardship to the Costumer's Guild West or the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel.

If you require accommodation for special needs covered under the ADA, you must notify the Costumer's Guild West and/or the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel no later than six (6) weeks before Costume College. Additionally, we will keep the information regarding your condition and special needs confidential. Only those members of the Costumer's Guild West and the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel who are in a "need to know" position will be informed of your situation.

Service Animals Accommodation

Dogs are the only service animals allowed at Costume College. If you are bringing a service dog, please notify our Hotel Liaison at cocohotelliaison@yahoo.com no later than six (6) weeks before Costume College.

Your dog will be allowed to be with you in most areas of the hotel, and Costume College, including classrooms, restrooms, the restaurant, lobby, Marketplace, Exhibits, and pool area, etc. However, due to health and safety laws you cannot bring the dog into the pools, or in the gym area.

The handler must maintain control over the dog at all times, either physically by leash, harness or tether, or by voice, signal, or other means. If the dog becomes uncontrollable (including repeated barking), or is not housebroken, the dog must leave the event.

The dog must always be with the handler and cannot be left behind in the hotel room.

If you do bring a service dog, please be considerate and understanding of others' allergies to your dog, or not liking or being afraid of dogs.

Emotional support, therapy, comfort and companion dogs are not considered service animals, and will not be allowed at Costume College. No other animals of any kind will be allowed at Costume College at any time.

Privacy Policy

What personal data we collect on our website and why we collect it

Media: If you upload or submit images for upload to the website (example: profile picture), as a precaution, you should avoid images with embedded location data (EXIF GPS) included. Visitors to the website can download and extract any location data from images publically available on the website.

User logins: CGW Members each have a login which allows them to view members' only content including back issues of our monthly newsletters, Squeals and the Broadsheet. Usernames and passwords are retained, saved in the MemberClicks site only, and are not stored anywhere else, nor is that information shared.

Cookies: If you have an account and you log into this site, we will set a temporary cookie to determine if your browser accepts cookies. This cookie contains no personal data and is discarded when you close your browser. When you log in, we will also set up several cookies to save your login information and your screen display choices. Login cookies last for two days, and screen options cookies last for a year. If you select "Remember Me", your login will persist for two weeks. If you log out of your account, the login cookies will be removed.

Embedded content from other websites: Articles on this site may include embedded content (e.g. videos, images, articles, etc.). Embedded content from other websites behaves in the exact same way as if the visitor has visited the other website. These websites may collect data about you, use cookies, embed additional third-party tracking, and monitor your interaction with that embedded content, including tracing your interaction with the embedded content if you have an account and are logged in to that website.

Third Party Providers: We occasionally make use of third party providers, such as the app we use for Costume College. In these cases, we often need to provide user data for access, including, but not limited to email addresses and names. In addition to restricting third-party access to only the pertinent subset of users, we share what data is needed and provide ways for that subset of users to either opt-out or opt-in, depending on the needs of the service.

Who we share your data with

Only the parties outlined within this document.

What Information do we collect

We collect personal contact information including name, mailing address, email, and phone number when users register for an event or create an account. Registered users can view and edit their personal information at any time (except they cannot change their username). Website administrators can also view and edit that information. This information is stored as long as the account is active.

Costume College Policies, continued

For some of our events we may ask for additional information on how the registrant identifies in the costuming community. Providing this information is voluntary and is stored on the event's registration form. The event registrar pulls this information (without names) to be shared with the CGW Board of Directors to help us continue to better serve our community. Other information you choose to provide in your account (such as profile picture) can be viewed only by you and website administrators.

How long we retain your data

We do not actively or automatically delete data from our database, but will delete upon request.

What rights you have over your data

If you have an account on this site you can request to receive an exported file of the personal data we hold about you, including any data you have provided to us. You can also request that we erase any personal data we hold about you. This does not include any data we are obliged to keep for administrative, legal, or security purposes.

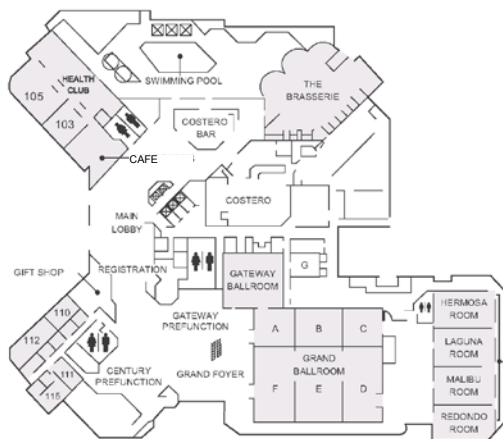

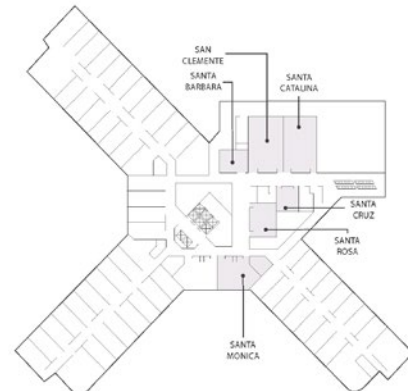
